Fact or Fiction?

Fact: One third of compulsive gamblers are women.

Fiction: Female gamblers brag when they win.

Fact: Most female gamblers do it to “escape.”

Fiction: Most women begin gambling at a very young age.

Fact: Most women stick to legal gambling.

Fiction: Female gamblers will not resort to illegal acts when they become desperate.

The Female Compulsive Gambler

In 1980, the American Psychiatric Association classified compulsive (pathological) gambling as a “disorder of impulse control.” It is the psychologically uncontrollable preoccupation and urge to gamble, and it is not discriminatory. With 1/3 of compulsive gamblers being women, it is possible that you or someone you care about is affected by this illness.

The Progression

The Winning Phase: Wins enhance the self-esteem and ego. Losses are rationalized as bad luck or poor advice. The gambler fantasizes about and is striving for “The Big Win.”

The Losing Phase: Losses increase and self-esteem becomes jeopardized. Gamblers begins chasing and borrowing money to “get even.” Common danger signals of this phase are lying, loan fraud, family disputes, absenteeism, and job changes.

The Desperation Phase: The gambler becomes obsessed with covering stolen money, secret loans, and withdrawals from bank accounts. She will panic at the thought that the gambling escape will end. Often, illegal activities begin to support the addiction. Severe mood swings set in, and suicide may be considered as a way out.

- ◆ Preoccupation with gambling
- ◆ Denial
- ◆ Shame & Guilt
- ◆ Chasing Losses
- ◆ Illegal Activities
- ◆ Manipulative Behavior & Lying
- ◆ Severe Mood Swings
- ◆ Financial Trouble
- ◆ Suicidal Thoughts
- ◆ Neglecting Responsibilities
